Maths

Place value battle – play with a grown up or an older sibling.

What to do:

Each player should draw a set of four squares next to each other on a piece of paper, as if you were going to write a four-digit number.

Version 1:

Players take it in turns to roll a die and write it on their chosen place value square. The aim of the game is to be the player with the greatest four-digit number at the end of the game. Good luck! Repeat for best of 5.

Version 2 (alternative version):

The game is played as above but this time a player can also place their number on one of their opponent's place value squares, if they would like to. Repeat for best of 5.

Think carefully about the value of the digit depending on which column you put it in. You could change the aim to get the lowest four-digit number.

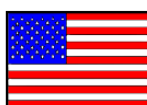
