Maths

This week we will be thinking about repeating patterns. Have a look around the house and outdoors to see if you can see any repeating patterns. Here are some ideas!











Use objects to make repeating patterns, such as 'sock, shoe, sock, shoe', or 'leaf, stone, leaf, stone'. You could try making patterns with 3, 4 or even 5 objects! Have a go at making a pattern for someone else in your house to follow!

Talk about the story and try to answer the following questions:

Where is the setting for the story?

Who are the characters in the story?

Where does Grandmother live?

What does Little Red Riding Hood take for her Grandmother?

How is the wolf feeling when he goes into Grandmother's cottage?

Where is Grandmother hiding?

What does the wolf say to Little Red Riding Hood?

What happens at the end of the story?

Now think about your favourite part of the story. Draw a picture of it and try to write a sentence about what happened.

Talk with your grown up about your drawing and ask them to check your sentence to make sure you have used your phonic skills to have a go at spelling words. Have you also remembered finger spaces and a full stop and capital letter? Bring you work to school so that we can see it too!
