Fluency

English

Look at the other photos taken with the camera. There's a lot going on under the water that we can't see, isn't there! Today I'd like you to choose your favourite picture. You need to write a description of it which includes a fronted adverbial, an apostrophe for possession and at least two expanded noun phrases. Remember that:

- A fronted adverbial is a sentence opener that says how, when or where something is happening. It is separated from the rest of the sentence with a comma

- An apostrophe for possession is used when something belongs to someone, the turtle's shell, for example

- Expanded noun phrases use a determiner, two adjectives and then a noun. To make your expanded noun phrase particularly impressive, say where the noun is. For example- two enormous, frightening starfish fought one another in the shallow water.

Foundation Subject – Geography

We're going to look more at volcanoes today and think about whether or not it is a good idea to live near them. I've included more information about volcanoes for you to read. Your job today is to decide whether or not you'd like to live next to one. When we get back to school we are going to debate this and decide whether it is a good or a bad thing to live next to a volcano so you need to prepare your argument! Remember that when we debate and discuss things we need to give good reasons to support our ideas to try to persuade other people to agree with us. You might make notes on what you are going to say and share your ideas with someone at home.
