Article 28 – the right to education
Every child has the right to an education.
Primary education must be free and different forms of secondary education must be available to every child.
Discipline in schools must respect children's dignity and their rights.
Richer countries must help poorer countries achieve this.

Here are some activities you might like to try:

- Imagine you have been asked to create your ideal timetable for a day or week at home or in school. Plan it out and decide what you would include and what you would leave out. Make sure it will provide children with a really good quality education!
 - Talk to relatives or friends who are older than you and ask them what school was like for them. What are their best and worst memories? How was school changed? How do you think knowing about rights improves life and learning in school?
- If you became the new Education Minister in the government, what would be the first thing you would do? Think carefully about what you think children and teachers need. You could have a go at writing your first speech describing the improvements you would make.
