



Some Mastery tasks for you today. Remember what I've said- telling the time is hard! All you can do is keep practising. I promise you that one day pretty soon you'll be able to look at the clock and just instantly be able to tell the time without even thinking, you just have to keep practising until you get there! These questions ask you to work with a partner, but because we're working from home your partner can be an adult you live with or an older brother or sister. You could even send these challenges to someone in a different house, like your grandma, and then chat to them about it over the phone!



English

Today I'm going to read you a myth set in the Underworld called 'Orpheus and Eurydice'. I've also uploaded the comic strip version. In a lot of myths, another name for the Underworld was Hades, named after the god himself. So the god Hades is also sometimes called Pluto, so that there is less confusion when people were telling stories. The planet Pluto is named after Pluto, god of the Underworld. I'd like you to read/listen to the myth and then answer these questions:

- 1. Eurydice was a nymph. Use a dictionary or look online- what is a nymph in Greek mythology?
- 2. Why were Pluto and Persephone so amazed that a living person reached their kingdom?
- 3. Why do you think Pluto agreed to release Eurydice from the Underworld on the condition that Orpheus didn't look back to see her?
- 4. Thinking about everything we know about Greek myths, would you saw Orpheus was a hero? Why?

Foundation Subject – History

We are incredibly lucky to live in a place that was so important to the Roman Empire. In AD 122, a Roman Emperor built a wall that stretched right across England from West to East. The wall ended in a place called Wallsend in Newcastle! I've included some basic information on Hadrian's Wall for you to look at, but because we all live so close to this wall, I'd love for you to do some research on it yourself. There are lots of places you can see ruins of the wall, all across Newcastle. Some people can even see where the wall used to run through their back gardens! It's almost all crumbled now, but at the time it was a huge, tall wall that was built to protect England from invaders in the North. There are a lot of places you can visit to see parts of Hadrian's Wall, Vindolanda and Segedunum are two places I've been- maybe you've been there too? Your job for me this week is to research Hadrian's Wall. You could find out where it was, what lives were like for the soldiers who patrolled it, who lived along it, what it looks like today or anything else that interests you!
