This week we're going to look at more Greek myths, but we're going to think about the types of characters we see in these stories. We already know that there is usually a competition between good and evil and that there is usually a hero in the stories. However, Greek myths are set in a mysterious time when gods and goddesses ruled Earth from their palace at the top of Mount Olympus (the tallest mountain in Greece). The King of all the Gods was called Zeus and he was extremely powerful. The Ancient Greeks believed that lightning was Zeus' weapon and that when they saw it in the sky, it was because Zeus was angry. Also, there were giants and monsters on Earth as well as people. Some of the myths tell us how things came to be. The myth we're going to look at today tells the story of how mankind discovered fire. I'm going to read it to you but also include it as a resource for you to read because today's story is presented as a comic strip so I'd like you to be able to look at it yourselves. What I'd like you to do is to answer these questions:

1. How is this myth different to the others we've looked at so far?
2. What do you think about Zeus' personality? Why do you think that?
3. Was Prometheus right to do what he did?

This story forms the first part of another myth too- we'll read that one on Wednesday...

Foundations Subject – Art
