
Can you remember what the difference between height and length is? Can you tell your grown up? Remember -Height is measuring how tall something is (up and down). Length is how long something is (from one end to the other).

## Non-standard forms of measure


Today we are going to use our knowledge to help us think about what we could use to measure different objects.

If we were measuring something small like a pencil, which objects could we use to measure it? We couldn't use something too long, so we would need to use something small, like paper clips, cubes or lego bricks. It is important that whichever object you use, they are all the same size like the paperclips below.

For example, for this pencil we could say "The pencil is four paper clips long."



It is very important that we measure in a straight line – why do you think this is? Look at the image below to help you think about this.



We need to measure using objects that are all the same size and make sure we line them up in a straight line with no gaps to make our measurement correct.

I would like you to work with a grown up to practise measuring the length/height of smaller objects such as pencils/kitchen utensils, and teddy bears using lego bricks/paperclips or anything else that you may have.

(Remember they have to all be the same size, so if you are using lego bricks, they all have to be the same size).

I would like you to try very hard to make sure the object you have chosen to measure with is in a straight line with no gaps in between.

### Challenge -

Can you write me a list of the objects you measured, along with its measurement? For example -

Spoon6 lego bricksPencil5 lego bricksTeddy bear23 lego bricks

OR


Could you write me a sentence, for example -

The spoon is 6 lego bricks long.

Can you tell me which object was the longest/shortest object that you measured?
