Answers -

Q1.

If the balance scale is down, what does that tell us?

The side which is down is heavier.

If the balance scale is up, what does that tell us?

The side which is up is lighter.

If the balance is level, what does that tell us?

If the scales are level, they are balanced, so both objects weigh the same.

Q2.

■ Fill in the missing gaps to make the sentences correct.



The football is heavier than the banana.

The sweet is lighter than the bread.

The apple is equal to the banana.

Q3. This is a tricky one!

The class are seeing whether the balloon or apple will weigh more.

Teddy is correct. However his explanation needs to be clearer. Children should practice using vocabulary such as heavier than and lighter than when comparing objects alongside talking about the movement of the scale.

Children should be encouraged to explain why the others are incorrect.

Q4.

Are larger objects always heavier than smaller objects?

Not always. Think of a brick and a beach ball. A beach ball is much bigger than a brick, but it is very light. A brick is much smaller than a beach ball, but is very heavy.
