Circle the names of two of these *Northern Saints*, and record what they are still remembered for.

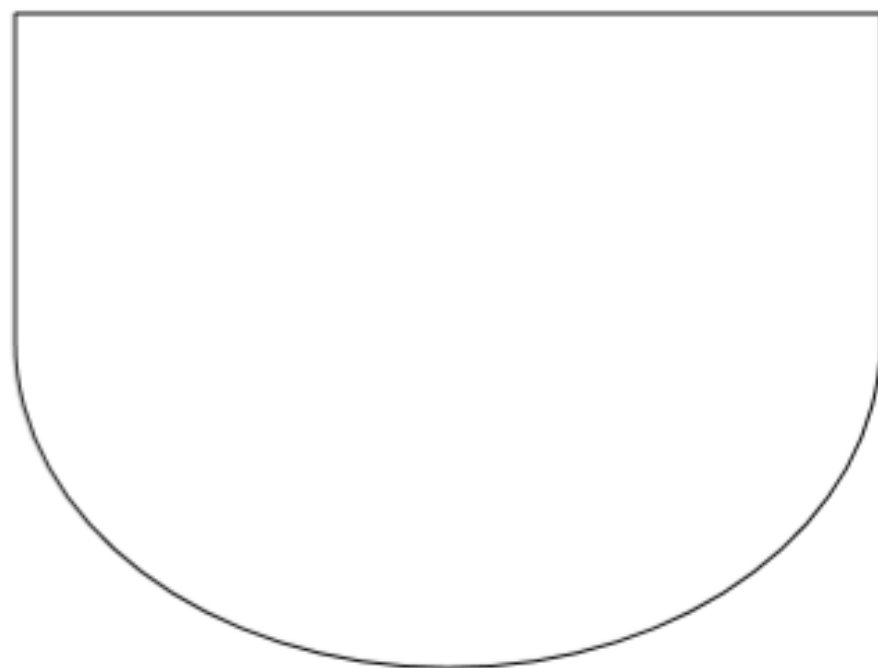
