She was married to Hephaestus, the god of blacksmiths and volcanoes, but she was not happy as she had been forced to marry him. Aphrodite was secretly in love with Ares, the god of war.

Interesting facts

Rather than being born, Aphrodite rose up out of sea foam as an adult- she was never a child. Both the Greeks and the Romans knew the story of her birth and worshipped her, but the Romans knew her as Venus. The planet Venus is named after her. This planet is visible as the brightest object in the sky (other than the moon) and can be seen in the morning and evening. It is known as the Morning Star.

Aphrodite often used her powers of love to involve herself in the lives of mortals. Therefore, she was well-known in ancient religions and is considered one of the twelve gods of Olympus.
