We're going back to basics again!

Simple, Compound and Complex Sentences. What do you remember?

A **simple sentence** has one idea. It is made up of a one main clause and contains a subject and a verb. It does not contain any conjunctions.

A **compound sentence is made up of more than one idea. It** has more than one verb. It is made up of two, or more, main clauses which still make sense on their own. **Compound sentences** use coordinating conjunctions, such as 'but', 'and' and 'so'. (FANBOYS)

A complex **sentence** has one main idea and at least one extra phrase or subordinate clause to give more information about the main point. Complex sentences use subordinating conjunctions like 'before', 'while' and 'if'. (I SAW A WABUB)
