**Maths**


Today you are going to move onto converting between analogue and digital times using a 24 hour clock. What do you notice about the time on a 24 hour clock, when it gets to 1 o'clock in the afternoon? Using your knowledge that there are 24 hours in a day, a 24 hour clock continues to count past 12 (e.g. 1 o'clock = 01:00p.m. = 13:00h). Do you know what the 24 hour clock will say at midnight? (00:00 – as the new day is starting the clock returns to the start). We don't need to use a.m. and p.m. when using a 24 hour clock because we can tell if it is morning (the hour digit is between 00 and 12) or if it is afternoon (the hour digit is between 12 and 23).

**Foundation Subject – French**

1. What is Bastille Day known as in French? **Bastille Day is known as la Fête Nationale Française. The date in French is le quatorze juillet**
2. Who were the king and queen of France in 1789? **During the French Revolution in 1789, the King of France was Louis XVI and his queen was Marie-Antoinette.**
3. What was the name given to people who supported the royal family at that time? **Anyone who was a friend or supporter of the royal family was called 'an enemy of the French people' - un ennemi du peuple.**
4. What is the motto of France and what does it mean in English? **The motto of France is Liberté, Égalité, Fraternité, (Freedom, Equality, Brotherhood).**
5. What happens now on l'Avenue des Champs-Élysées? **Nowadays, every year on 14th July, there are big parades in Paris, especially on the famous road called l'Avenue des Champs-Élysées.**
6. How did the French people celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Bastille Day? **To celebrate the 100th anniversary of Bastille Day, the Eiffel Tower (la Tour Eiffel) was built on the ground of the very first Bastille Day celebrations.**
